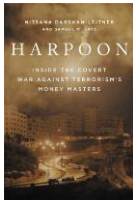

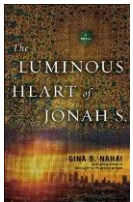

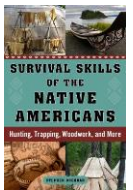
The luminous heart of Jonah S., by Gina B. Nahai. The Soleyman, an Iranian Jewish family, are

Exiles from the war: the war guests diary of Charlotte Mary Twiss. Guelph, Ontario,

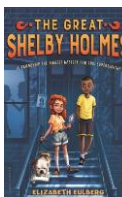

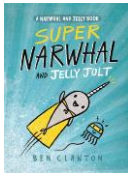

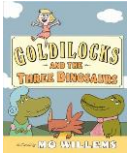


Picture Books
